MAHA SHOW RULES & REGULATIONS

- Entry fee is \$45.00 plus \$5.00 bedding fee per breeding animal and \$10 per steer, with the exception of group classes. Entries must be
 postmarked by April 20, 2023 A \$10.00 per animal late fee will be charged for entries postmarked later than April 20, no entries
 postmarked after April 25 will be accepted.
- 2. Cattle must be in place by Friday May 12th at 12:00 PM.
- 3. Exhibitors must be members of the American Highland Cattle Association (AHCA) or Canadian Highland Cattle Society (CHCS). Exhibitors must also be members of the MidAtlantic Highland Association (MAHA)
- 4. Exhibitors are required to post a card over each animal stating: name, registration #, birth date, sire & dam.
- 5. Exhibitor's numbers must be worn while showing.
- 6. Farm signs and decorations are encouraged.
- 7. All animals must be tied with a neck rope in addition to a regular halter.
- 8. The exhibitor is responsible for the health of the animal. The Show Committee has the right to call for the services of a veterinarian to treat an animal that is sick or injured if the exhibitor is not available. The fee must be paid by the exhibitor prior to release of the animal.
- 9. Any animal deemed uncontrollable by the Ring Steward will be excused from the show ring.
- 10. The Show Committee will use reasonable diligence to insure the safety of the exhibitors after their arrival and placement, but in no case will they be responsible for any loss or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any animals or articles on exhibition. The exhibitors shall indemnify the Show Committee, AHCA and MAHA of all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto. The placing of any exhibits on the show grounds by any and all signifies their agreement to abide by this rule.
- 11. The Open Show will comply with the AHCA Show Rules and the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics. Rules & information that specifically pertain only to the Junior Show will be found in the Junior section of this entry packet.
- 12. Premier Breeder & Premier Exhibitor awards will be given to the breeder or exhibitor having the highest number of points based on a maximum of the five highest placing animals in the single classes owned by that breeder or exhibitor. Points shall be awarded as follows: 1st-5 pts, 2nd-4 pts, 3rd-3pts, 4th-2pts, 5th-1 pts. No points given for Division or Grand Champion.
 - Animals shown in the Junior Show and Showmanship Division must be first entered in their respective Open Show division classes.

AHCA Rules for ROE Sanctioned Shows

- 1. Owners must be members in good standing of the American Highland Cattle Association or Canadian Highland Cattle Society.
- 2. All animals must be owned by the owner and breeding stock registered with the American Highland Cattle Association or Canadian Highland Cattle Society.
- 3. All shows will conform with IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and show rules (see www.highlandcattleusa.org).
- 4. Registration papers must be presented to show officials or AHCA representatives upon request.
- 5. Tattoos must be legible and correspond to registration papers.
- 6. Use of hormones or steroids in animals exhibited is prohibited.
- 7. Purebred breeding cattle may not be dehorned.
- 8. A calf in the cow/calf class must be the cow's natural calf, still nursing and a maximum of 250 days old. Both the cow and calf must be registered purebred Highland cattle.
- 9. All bulls 12 months or older must be shown with a nose ring or nose lead. Note: We recommend that bulls be experienced with nose ring or nose lead prior to showing the animal.
- 10. All ROE shows attended will be counted in the cow/calf division. In the case of a tie for the cow/calf division, the cow/calf that has defeated the most animals will be the winner.
- 11. Registered & unregistered steers (pure and crossbred) & registered Sovereign heifers, will be included in the point show animal count.
- 12. Only registered pure and crossbred steers and registered Sovereign heifers will count toward the Premier Breeder and Exhibitor awards.
- 13. Animals in group classes Get-of-Sire, Produce-of-Dam and Breeders Herd must be registered purebred Highland cattle.
- 14. Jackpot classes will be left to the discretion of each individual show to structure as they see fit (purebred/Sovereign/crossbred).
- 15. Show organizers will use the Herdbook Search on AHCA's website to verify all animal names/numbers are correct in your show catalogs.
- 16. Also, all owners should be verified as current AHCA members and cattle entered on their entry forms are in their ownership.
- 17. A junior's age is determined as their age on January 1st and can show in junior classes through age 21.
- 18. Special consideration will be extended at all shows for persons with developmental disabilities to show in the junior show through age 26.

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expos* and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1). All animals must be accompanied by a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and official identification. A CVI shall be issued within the 30 days prior to entry at event. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.

Federal Regulations require official animal identification. Official identification has a US shield which includes a USDA issued NUES tag, a 15 digit Animal Identification Number ear tag that starts with "840", or other official identification approved by USDA.

2). Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:

- a. No test required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.
- b. All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test-negative within 60 days prior to entry.
- c. All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" (includes part of Michigan) must: (1) Originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative for TB within 12 months prior to entry; and
- (2) The animals to be imported have tested negative to TB within 60 days prior to entry and at least 60 days after the whole herd test.
- d. Any animals for which b or c would apply must have the negative test results included on the CVI and be accompanied by a negative test result (a copy of the original test report is acceptable)
- 3). Statement: Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 4). It is recommended that all animals be vaccinated/boostered against BVD/shipping fever complex within 180 days prior to the show and no fewer than 15 days prior to the show. It is recommended that animals over 3 months of age receive a current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian (observe proper slaughter withdraw time)

- 3. Premiums for the Junior Steers are applicable only to the Junior Steer Showperson entered in the event.
- 4. Animals shown in the Junior Show and Showmanship Division must be entered in their respective Open Show division classes.
- 5. Juniors are encouraged to help out others and to HAVE FUN!!!!

Junior Herdsmanship Contest

Junior shows positive attitude. Junior demonstrates cooperation & willingness to work with other Juniors, Open Show exhibitors, & attendees
